

Old Testament Reading: Exodus 20:1-17

¹ And God spoke all these words, saying, ² "I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery. 3"You shall have no other gods before me. 4"You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. ⁵ You shall not bow down to them or serve them, for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate me, ⁶ but showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments. 7 "You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain, for the LORD will not hold him guiltless who takes his name in vain. 8 "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. 9 Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, ¹⁰ but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. ¹¹ For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Epistle: Romans 6:1-11

¹What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? ² By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? ³ Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴ We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. ⁵ For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in

a resurrection like his. ⁶We know that our old self was crucified with him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷For one who has died has been set free from sin. ⁸Now if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God. ¹¹So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Holy Gospel*: Matthew 5:17-26

The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the 5th chapter. Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

¹⁷ "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them. ¹⁸ For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished. ¹⁹ Therefore whoever relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be called least in the kingdom of heaven, but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. ²⁰ For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. ²¹ "You have heard that it was said to those of old, 'You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment.' ²² But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, 'You fool!' will be liable to the hell of fire. ²³ So if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, ²⁴ leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. ²⁵ Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison. ²⁶ Truly, I say to you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

Announcements

What Does This Mean: Are you wondering what those letters are on the front of your bulletin? They are the first ten letters of the Hebrew alphabet, and you read them from right to left. And as the first ten letters of the Hebrew alphabet are set on two tables, they are highlighting the Ten Commandments, which are describe in the Old Testament reading for this day.

Hymn of the Month: The hymn of the month for July is Paul Gerhardt's (1607-1676) hymn, 'All Christians Who Have Been Baptized' (LSB 596). The hymn's earliest source directed that it be sung to the tune of the great justification hymn, "Salvation unto us has come" (LSB 556). Yet, LSB sets it to the tune of Martin Luther's justification hymn, "Dear Christians, one and all, rejoice" (LSB 556). Either hymn is fitting for this Baptism hymn, for Baptism gives the gift of justification (God's declaration of righteousness for Christ's sake) to sinners. And so, in stanza 1, Gerhardt invites us to consider the gift that God "gives to everyone baptized into Christ Jesus" (Stz. 1). Gerhardt's use of "you" and "us" in the hymn makes it clear that the new birth by water and the Spirit in Baptism (John 3:5-6) brings the comfort of Christ's atonement to all who are baptized. However, is Baptism really necessary? Stanzas 2 and 3 answer that question: "You were before your day of birth...condemned and lost with all the earth" (Psalm 51:5; Romans 3:23). Yet, "all of that was washed away in Baptism. Baptism is a great comfort for:

- · sin is "washed away Immersed and drowned forever" (Stz. 3),
- · it restores a sinner (Stz. 3),
- · it is where we "put on Christ-Our shame is full covered" (Stz.4), and
- · "here the flood of [Christ's] own blood now makes us holy, right, and good before our heavenly Father" (Stz. 4).

All of this gives us Christians the confidence to live in Christ, "in all that you endeavor" (Stz. 5) "within your own vocation" (Stz. 6). I pray God's richest blessings as you sing and meditate on this hymn.
