CATECHETICAL THEME:

5th & 6th Commandments

This Week's Catechetical Theme: 5th & 6th Commandments

We continue our consideration of the Ten Commandments this week by focusing on the Fifth and Sixth Commandments. In the Fifth Commandment, God instructs us, "You shall not murder." The reason for this is that God is the author of life (Acts 3:15). He gives and He takes away (Job 1:21). As we confess in the Creed, He is the Lord and giver of life. He desires not the death of anyone (Ezek 18:32). To that end, to protect the lives which He gives, the LORD has given the Fifth Commandment. "You shall not murder," is God's revealed will that we are to protect and defend life in all its stages, from the very beginning, when it is conceived, to the very end, when death occurs. What the Lord gives is the Lord's to take away—not ours. And so, in the Fifth Commandment we learn to fear and love God so that we help and support our neighbor in every physical need.

Where God protects His gift of life in the Fifth Commandment, in the Sixth Commandment, the LORD upholds and protects the sacred institution of Holy Matrimony. Even before the fall into sin, the LORD had established one man and one woman to live together, forsaking all others, and to be devoted to one another. This was to be a comprehensive union of body, mind and spirit, from which life would flow as children were given. While the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh desires to tear down this holy union, the Sixth Commandment is God's Word by which He teaches His people to consider marriage as a gift of God, and honor it with our life and actions. God bless your time in His Word!

The Catechism: The 5th & 6th Commandments

Questions to Discuss in the Home

Fri: How are wives taught to relate to their husbands? In what role is the husband? How is Christ Himself the model for the husband? How then is the husband supposed to treat His wife? What is marriage given to be a picture of? Sat: In preparation for Sunday, reflect upon today's texts.
